EUROPEAN PEACE UNIVERSITY IRELAND SHIFTS GEAR

EPU-Ireland started up in the Leitrim village of Dromahair in the autumn of 1996. About 27 students from four continents spent three months attending peace lectures and field trips. It was hoped that substantial funds from government and other sources would enable further groups of students to attend but administrative staff realise that a longer timescale is needed for large financial commitments. Accordingly the Dromahair campus in the near future will develop activities which are more financially feasible, including: practical skills training courses, service support and discussion forums for those working in cross-border and cross community peace related projects adult/community education courses, seminars and lectures for the local and regional area civilian peacekeeping training courses for Irish and international NGO staff. ON YER BIKE - a quick round up of cycle developments and campaigning

There are two large bicycle campaigning organisations, in Belfast and Dublin. □ The Northern Ireland Cycling Initiative has 200 members and can be contacted c/o Peter Gray, Membership Secretary, 16 Belmont Place, Belfast BT4 3FN (send s.a.e. for info), phone 01232 - 645909; their AGM is coming up on Saturday 13th September. □ The Dublin Cycling Campaign is contactable at either Square Wheel Cycleworks, Temple Lane South, Dublin 2, phone 6790838 or Belfield Bike Store, University Campus, Belfield, Dublin 4, phone 2600749. Both organisations are involved in a range of cycle campaigning. Other individuals known for their cycle campaigning include □ Paddy O'Callaghan of O'Callaghan Cycles in Killarney Town Centre, Co Kerry (particularly involved in creating a Ring of Kerry cycle route) and □ Cllr Dan Boyle of the Green Party in Cork. Meanwhile, in terms of broader developments, □ the engineering charity Sustrans is working to develop cycle routes across Northern Ireland as part of the UK cycle network with £3m Millennium Commission money; the first part of this has been opened in Craigavon, and it will link most major town centres with safe cycle routes for everyday journeys as well as leisure by 2000. Sustrans, McAvoy House, 17a Ormeau Avenue, Belfast BT2 8HD, phone 01232 - 434569. □ The DOE are organising a Belfast conference on the National Cycling Strategy on 30th Sept. □ Meanwhile Dublin Corporation proposes to have a 130km Strategic Cycle Network including 14 commuter links and an inner city network; their strategy aims to double the number of cyclists from the current 5% of commuter journeys to the city centre within 10 years. Editorial; ROADBLOCK REMOVED; JOURNEY REMAINS VERY DIFFICULT

The resumption of the IRA ceasefire, on 20th July, removes one roadblock from political progress. But the journey remains extremely difficult with the main unionist parties rejecting the time-scale and/or whole process proposed by the British and Irish governments with grave difficulties over 'decommissioning'. There are two lessons from the last ceasefire. Unless moves are made to include republicans in a real process of political discussion at the top level within a limited time period, it can be assumed that this latest ceasefire will also break down. And there is the hard lesson that sectarian tensions can actually increase during a ceasefire or low violence period and things can therefore get worse before they get better. Hold onto your hats, folks, we're in for a bumpy ride. - A short editorial from a medium sized editor.
