AMNESTY INTERNATIONAL -

Amnesty International (AI) was founded in 1961 following a newspaper appeal by British lawyer Peter Benenson; today it has over 1,000,000 members, subscribers and regular donors in over 170 countries and there are nationally organised sections in 55 countries (many of these in the South). Its mandate is to campaign to free all prisoners of conscience (people detained anywhere for their beliefs or because of their ethnic origin, sex, colour or language, who have not used or advocated violence; ensure fair and prompt trails for political prisoners; abolish the death penalty, torture and other cruel or inhuman or degrading treatment of prisoners; end extrajudicial executions and 'disappearances'; oppose abuses by opposition groups including hostage taking and torture.

In the Republic

in the Republic there is a membership of around 8,000 people. There are 48 groups who work on country campaigning, lobbying, fundraising, publicity and may also have their own action file (these 'action files' cover a number of different types of human rights violation, including prisoners of conscience, death penalty dossiers, and 'disappearance' dossiers). There are about 150 school and youth groups and most trade unions are affiliated. There are also a women's network, a religious network, a children's network and an urgent action network for people who are willing to take action urgently on cases where there is fear of torture or an imminent execution or serious health concern. The membership is serviced by the secretariat at 48 Fleet Street, Dublin 2, which centrally looks after home government lobbying and national publicity. A magazine is produced for members every two months (16 pages, A3 size).

Membership is £18 individual, £25 for a couple/household, £6 unwaged individual, £9 unwaged couple, or you can just make a donation.

In the North

There are nearly 900 members of Amnesty International and membership is increasing rapidly; the NI Region operates as part of the UK section of Amnesty. The possibility of establishing a number of new groups is being investigated. One major development is an Amnesty Ni Children's Action Network to raise public awareness about the child victims of human rights abuses and to expose those responsible. They were involved in a substantial campaign about Ken Saro-Wiwa and are calling on people to write to General Sani Abacha, Chairman Provisional Ruling Council, State House, Aso Rock, Abuja, Nigeria, to express their condemnation of his hanging.

As part of Pax Christi's ongoing work on landmines, Dr Pierre Ryckmans from Belgium recently came to Dublin as a guest of Pax Christi and addressed a public meeting. Belgium is the first country to introduce legislation banning the manufacture, importation, and exportation of anti-personnel mines (i.e. this is a legislative measure not a temporary moratorium). 'AIM TO SUSTAIN' - Northern grants for sustainability projects
